

#### REFUGEES & INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS LAW

A **REFUGEE** is someone who is recognized as being forced to leave their country because of war or fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion. – 1951 Refugee Convention

An **ASYLUM SEEKER** is someone who has fled their country because of armed conflict or violence but who has not yet been recognized as a refugee by a host country government.

An **INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSON (IDP)** is a person who is forced to flee their home because of armed conflict or violence but who has not crossed an international border, and thus remains under the protection of their own government, even if their government was the cause of their flight. — *United Nations* 

A determination of a person's refugee status cannot be made solely on the basis of their nationality. An individual assessment is required.

The concept of a "Safe Country" does not exist in international human rights law.

#### International human rights law guarantees refugees the following rights:

- The right to housing
- The right to education
- The right to freedom of movement
- The right to work

#### THE DEADLY MEDITERRANEAN

- 1,015,078 migrants arrived by sea to Europe in 2015\*
- 84% of sea arrivals to Europe come to Greece\*
- An average of 1,866 migrants arrived to Greece by sea the first 79 days of 2016\*
- 488 migrants are dead or missing while attempting to reach Europe by sea in the first 79 days of 2016\*
- Since the death of Aylan Kurdi, an average of two children have died every day trying to make the crossing to Europe.<sup>1</sup>






#### LIFE AS A SYRIAN REFUGEE CHILD

#### Many Syrian refugee children can't go to school.

- It is estimated that 3 million (43%) Syrian refugee children are not in school<sup>1</sup>
- In Turkey, the largest Syrian refugee population, only 25% of refugee children are in school<sup>2</sup>

### Some Syrian refugee children have to work to support their families.

In Turkey refugee children were found working in sweatshops.<sup>3</sup>

### Many Syrian refugee children do not get enough to eat.

- Malnutrition rates are near 3%<sup>4</sup>
- 6.6 million Syrians are considered "food insecure", but only 5.5 million receive food aid and rations from the UN's food program (WFP).5

## Many other basic needs of Syrian refugee children are not being met.

- Around 10% of Syrian refugees in the Middle East live in camps.
- Conditions in refugee camps in the Middle East and Europe vary widely: some camps provide shelter, heat, food, school, drinking water and sanitation while others do not.



# INTERNATIONAL RESPONSE TO SYRIA'S CIVIL WAR



Most Syrian refugees remain in the Middle East.\*

Only an estimated 10% of Syrian refugees have fled to European countries.\*

The number of Syrian refugees resettled has nothing to do with a country's size or wealth.

The USA, one of the wealthiest and largest countries has resettled only 2,174 Syrian refugees, although the UN has submitted the applications of 32,369 Syrian refugees for consideration by the US.
